Gaur (2024) observed that NEP 2020 promotes the inclusion of IKS through curriculum reforms, teacher training, and research initiatives, aiming to strengthen cultural identity and holistic development. Similarly, **Shanwal (2025)** found that IKS integration enhances critical thinking, creativity, and problem-solving skills, though challenges such as lack of resources, trained teachers, and clear guidelines persist.

Jyotishi (2025) emphasized that IKS integration in higher education can foster sustainability, interdisciplinary learning, and global relevance, but faces issues like standardization, funding constraints, and limited international recognition. **Baral (2024)** further suggested that effective implementation requires structured curriculum design, teacher capacity building, and continuous evaluation.

2.2 Indian Knowledge Systems in Ancient and Modern Education: Studies by **Gupta and Dhingra (2025)** and **Rao (2025)** highlight that IKS, rooted in traditional practices such as Ayurveda, yoga, and Vedic mathematics, offers a holistic and sustainable approach to education. **Sharma and Maheshwari (2024)** noted that integrating ancient wisdom into modern education enhances cultural awareness, foundational learning, and problem-solving abilities. However, they emphasized the need for standardized curricula and scientifically validated content to ensure effective integration.

2.3 IKS and Holistic Education: Research indicates that IKS significantly contributes to holistic development by integrating intellectual, emotional, and ethical dimensions of learning. **Amani (2024)** and **Suman and Jyoti (2025)** observed that IKS-based education promotes sustainability, value-based learning, and cultural identity. **Kamalakar and Vageeshan (2024)** highlighted that government initiatives under NEP 2020 are fostering student development through curriculum and co-curricular integration, though challenges related to pedagogy, infrastructure, and teacher training remain.

2.4 Gurukul System and Traditional Pedagogy: The traditional Gurukul system has been widely recognized as a foundation of Indian education. **Adhikari (2022)** and **Tudu (2025)** noted that Gurukul pedagogy emphasized holistic development, discipline, and moral values, which continue to influence modern education. **Madhekar (2020)** and **Aher and Saify (2025)** suggested that integrating Gurukul

principles—such as experiential learning and personalized mentorship—with modern technology can enhance educational quality. Joshi (2021) further emphasized its role in character building and spiritual development.

2.5 Role of Yoga and Philosophy in Education: Studies by Chandratreya et al. (2024) and Chauhan and Bansal (2024) highlight the relevance of yoga and Indian philosophy in addressing contemporary educational challenges. Practices such as meditation, mindfulness, and ethical reasoning contribute to holistic well-being and leadership development. Gupta (2024) found that integrating yoga and mindfulness improves emotional resilience and academic performance. Earlier work by Joseph S. Alter (2005) also demonstrated how yoga has evolved while maintaining its core philosophical foundations

Most studies remain conceptual or philosophical, limiting their applicability in real educational contexts. Second, the absence of structured and standardized frameworks for integrating IKS across different levels of education creates inconsistency in implementation. Without a clear pedagogical model, institutions often struggle to incorporate IKS meaningfully into curricula.
- Third, the literature reveals a limited focus on practical implementation challenges**, including teacher preparedness, infrastructural limitations, and the availability of authentic learning resources. Teachers play a crucial role in translating policy into practice; however, insufficient training and lack of orientation toward IKS hinder effective classroom integration. Fourth, although IKS is inherently interdisciplinary, its application across domains such as science, technology, and social sciences remains

underexplored. This restricts its potential to contribute to innovation and problem-solving in contemporary education.

- iv. **Finally, a significant gap exists between policy formulation and actual practice.** While the National Education Policy 2020 provides a strong conceptual foundation for IKS integration, its implementation at the institutional level is often fragmented and inconsistent. This policy–practice gap underscores the need for systematic planning, monitoring, and evaluation mechanisms.

To address these challenges, the present study adopts a qualitative research design based on the analysis of secondary data sources, including academic literature, policy documents, and digital repositories. Through thematic content analysis, key dimensions such as holistic education, sustainability, ethical learning, and cultural identity were identified, categorized, and synthesized.
